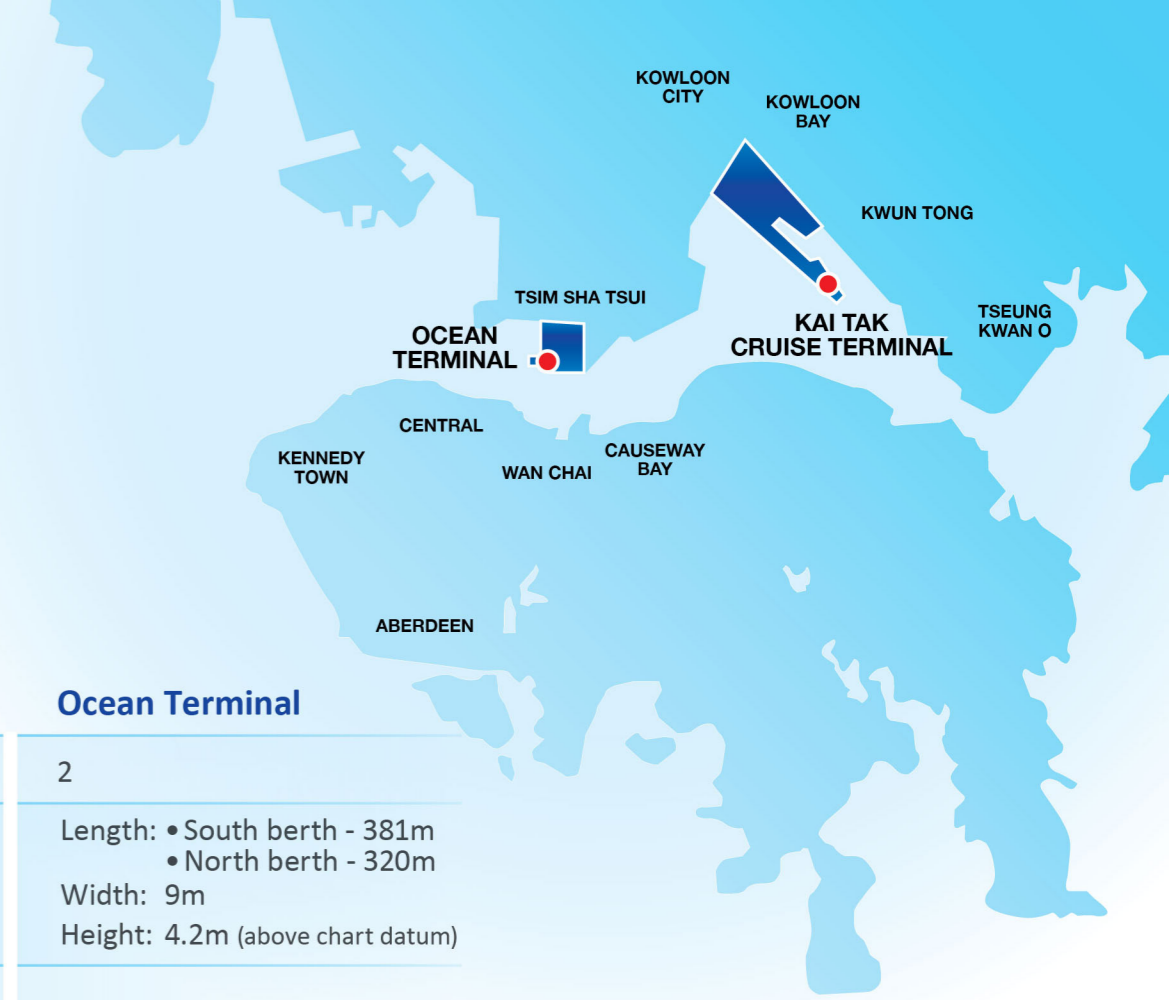
The **Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge** has shortened the travel time between Zhuhai and Hong Kong International Airport to 45 minutes.

Kai Tak Cruise Terminal — an architectural gem

Take in the striking skyline for which Hong Kong is famous as you sail into this sleek, futuristic and environmentally friendly cruise terminal designed by Foster + Partners. Situated on the runway of Hong Kong's former airport, the Kai Tak Cruise Terminal is part of the Kai Tak Development project, which is transforming Kowloon East into a vibrant area for leisure, entertainment and commerce.

In the vicinity of the terminal, cruise travellers can find a great variety of things to do, from marvelling at traditional Chinese architecture at Chi Lin Nunnery, Nan Lian Garden and Wong Tai Sin Temple, to sampling mouth-watering cuisines in Kowloon City, dubbed 'Little Thailand', and the famous seafood town Lei Yue Mun. And of course, shopping malls like Telford Plaza and apm are there to satisfy those in the mood to shop.

Delve into local culture

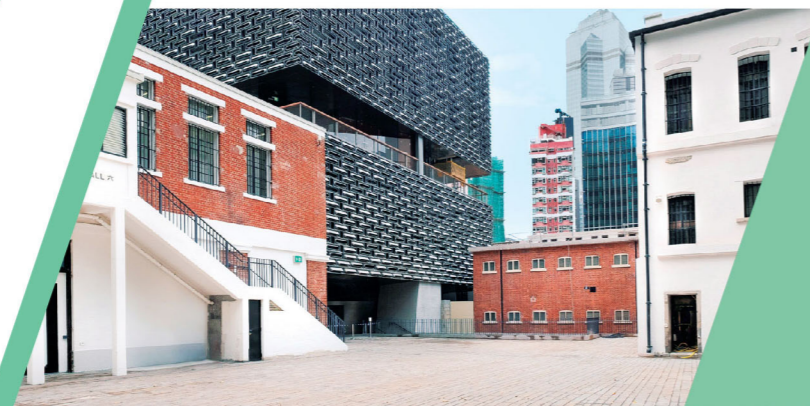
Stroll through urban neighbourhoods and keep your eyes peeled for surprising delights.

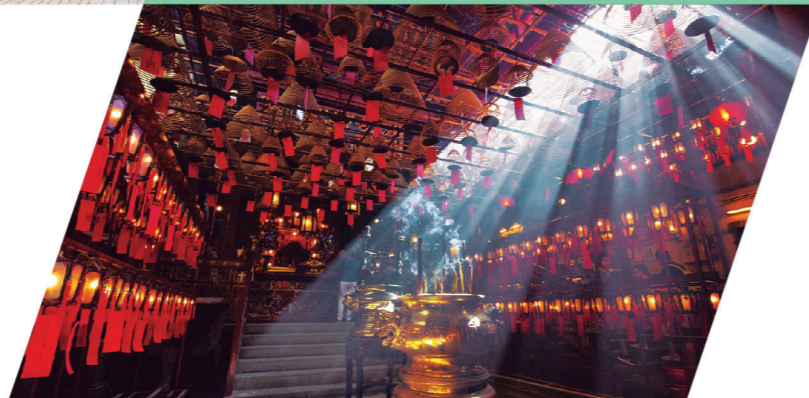
Cultural hub
